

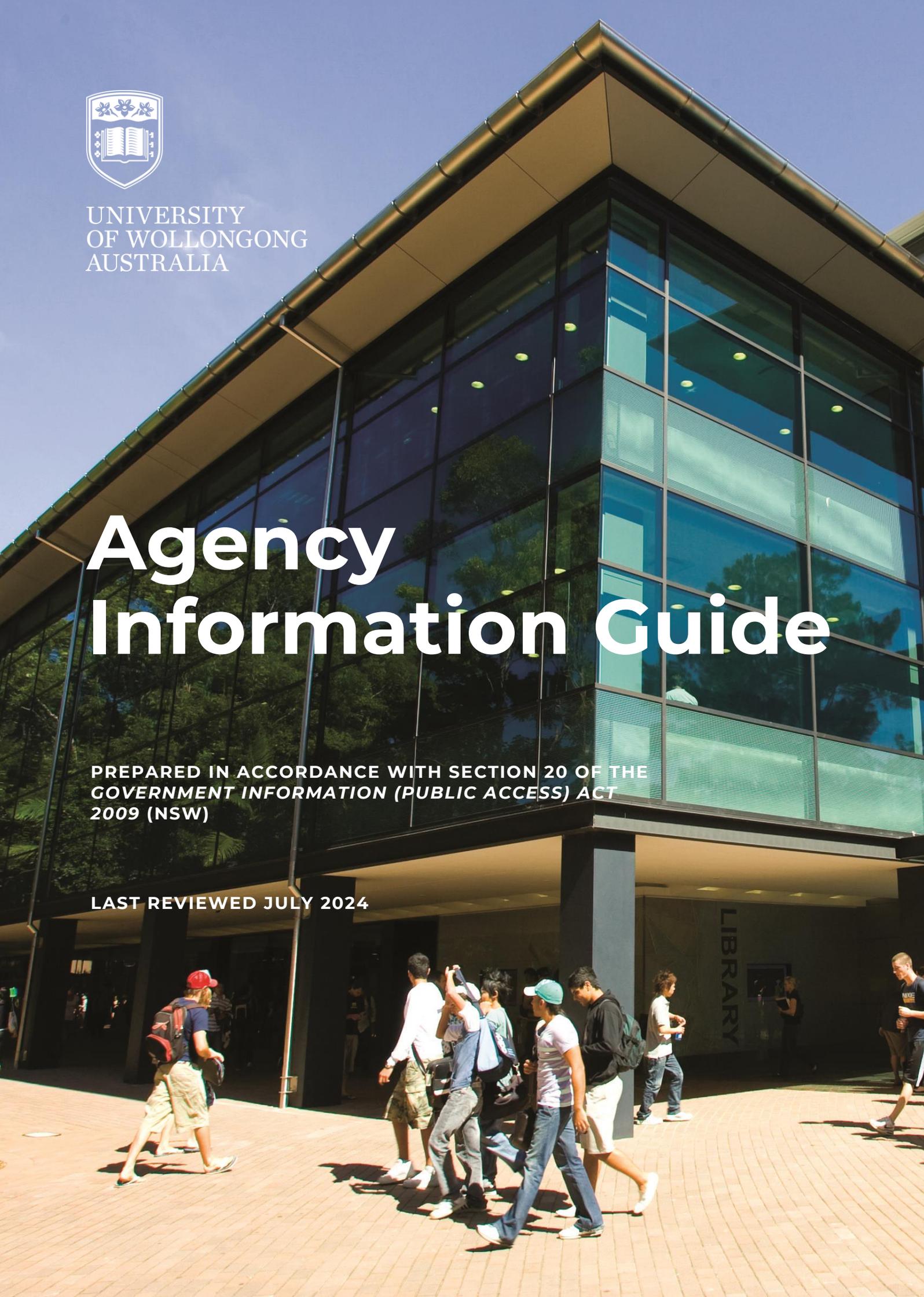

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Introduction

The *Government Information (Public Access) Act 2009* ("GIPA Act") provides members of the public with a right of access to information held by the University of Wollongong ("University").

The University proactively makes information publicly available on its comprehensive website at uow.edu.au.

This Agency Information Guide (AIG) is produced pursuant to section 20 of the GIPA Act and provides a mechanism through which members of the public are informed of:

- The University's structures and functions,
- The ways in which the University's functions affect members of the public,
- How members of the public can participate in policy development and the exercise of the University's functions
- The kinds of information held by the University, and
- How to access information held by the University.

University Governance

Encompassing committees, policies and processes, and legislative compliance, the University's governance and ethical environment is grounded within a framework that fosters accountable, consistent and transparent decision making.

There are a number of legislative instruments that apply to the University's functions and operations. Information about the legislative instruments applicable to the University can be found at: uow.edu.au/about/governance/legislation. Though not exhaustive, the site provides information on the instruments of legislation that have a significant role in the University's management and functions.

The *University of Wollongong Act 1989* (NSW) establishes the University and provides for its governance. The *University of Wollongong By-Law 2005* (NSW) provides for detailed requirements in relation to certain matters contained in the *University of Wollongong Act 1989* (NSW).

Under the *University of Wollongong Act 1989* (NSW), the University Council ("Council") is the governing authority of the University. Council acts for and on behalf of the University and controls and manages the University's affairs and concerns.

As Council is unable to make all the decisions necessary to run a large and complex organisation like a University, the *University of Wollongong Act 1989* (NSW) allows Council to delegate all or any of its functions (except its power of delegation) to any member or committee of Council or to any authority or officer of the University or to any other person or body prescribed by the *University of Wollongong By-Law 2005* (NSW).

University Council has established a number of committees which perform specific functions, consider detailed issues and make recommendations to Council.

UNIVERSITY COMMITTEES

The Academic Senate is established under the *University of Wollongong Act 1989* (NSW) and is the principal academic body of the University, having responsibility for advising the University Council and the Vice-Chancellor on matters relating to teaching, scholarship, research and related activities in accordance with these terms of reference.

The Finance and Infrastructure Committee ("FIC") is a formally constituted committee of University Council with particular responsibility for advising Council on the University's financial and infrastructure sustainability strategies. The FIC is responsible for assuring oversight of the University's operational policies and is the Executive Committee of Council, delegated to take action on urgent issues between Council meetings.



The Risk, Audit and Compliance Committee (“RACC”) is a formally constituted committee of the University Council. RACC has a particular responsibility to assist and advise Council in fulfilling its corporate governance and independent oversight responsibilities in relation to the University’s management of risk, compliance with legislation and standards, its internal control structure and audit requirements, and its external reporting responsibilities. This function is provided under the authority of, and in accordance with, the *University of Wollongong Act 1989* (NSW).

The website lists the terms of reference, including its membership, of each Council committee. Generally, Council committee membership is made up of Council members, and in some cases, academic staff members of the University who are appointed to the committee by Council on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor, and in other cases, professional staff officers, depending on the issues of the committee.

UNIVERSITY POLICIES

The University’s policies govern the University’s decision-making and outline the rights, privileges, benefits, obligations, and penalties to which the University community may be entitled, eligible, liable or subject to.

Policy documents may contain:

- interpretation, rules, guidelines, statements of policy, practices or precedents;
- particulars of any administrative scheme.
- manner of administration of any legislative instrument or administrative scheme; or
- procedures for investigation of any contravention of any legislative instrument or administrative scheme.

Organisational Structure

Whilst the University Council is responsible for the oversight and stewardship of the University, the University’s day to day business is managed by the Vice-Chancellor and President and the Senior Executive.

The Vice-Chancellor and President is the principal executive officer of the University and has the following functions conferred under section 12 of the *University of Wollongong Act 1989* (NSW):

- (i) promote and further the development and interests of the University including, but without limiting the generality of this clause, the welfare



- of staff and students;
- (ii) be responsible to Council for the general, academic, administrative, financial and other business of the University;
 - (iii) exercise a general supervision over all staff and students of the University;
 - (iv) do all things ancillary to those functions referred to (i), (ii) and (iii);
 - (v) exercise such functions and authority as may from time to time be delegated by the Council; and
 - (vi) by virtue of the office of Vice-Chancellor, be a member of any board, committee or faculty within the University and, unless the Council determines otherwise, may preside at a meeting of any such board, committee or faculty.

SOCIAL MEDIA

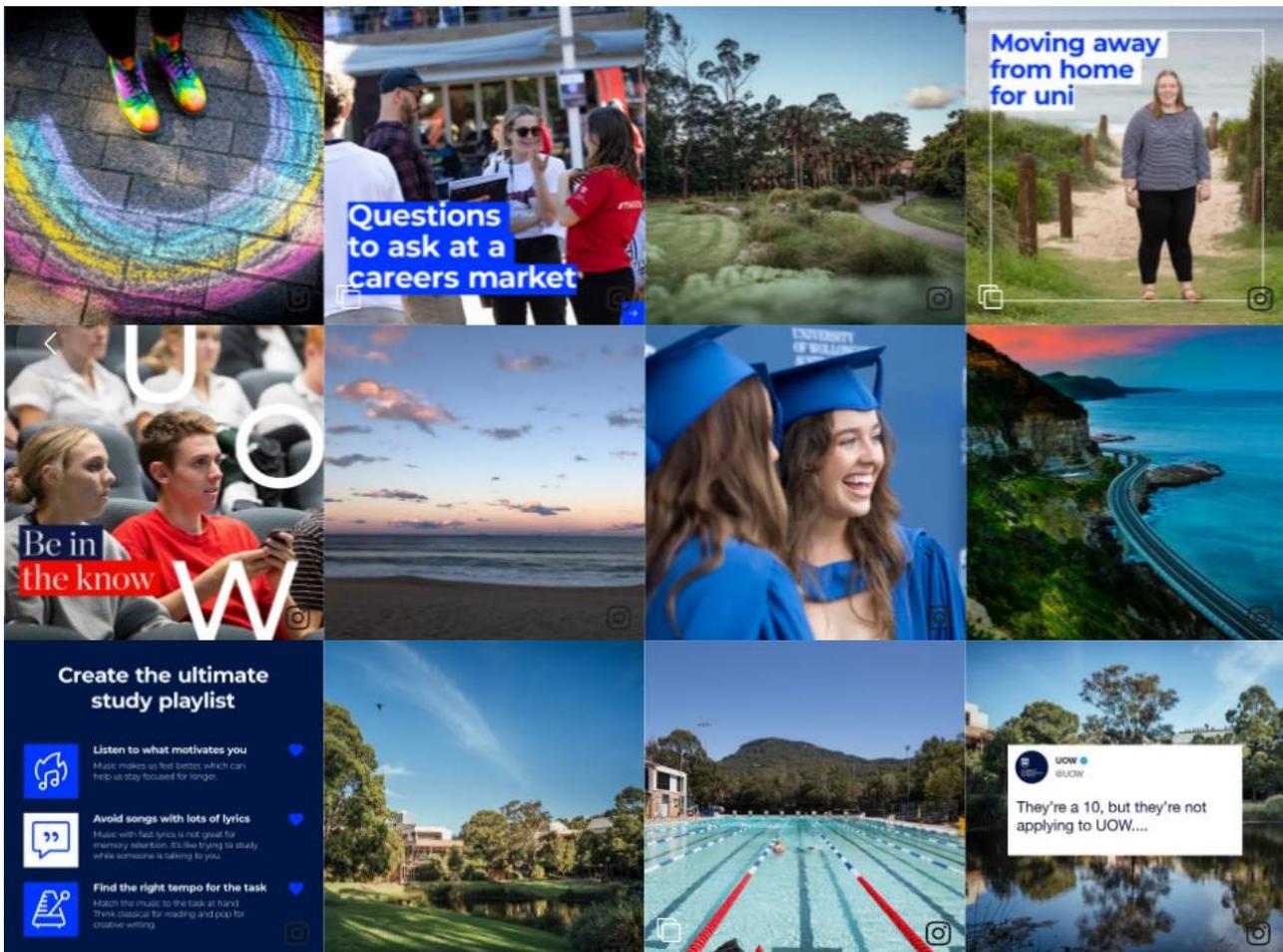
The University uses a range of social media channels to facilitate an open forum to engage with its audiences and for audiences to engage with each other.

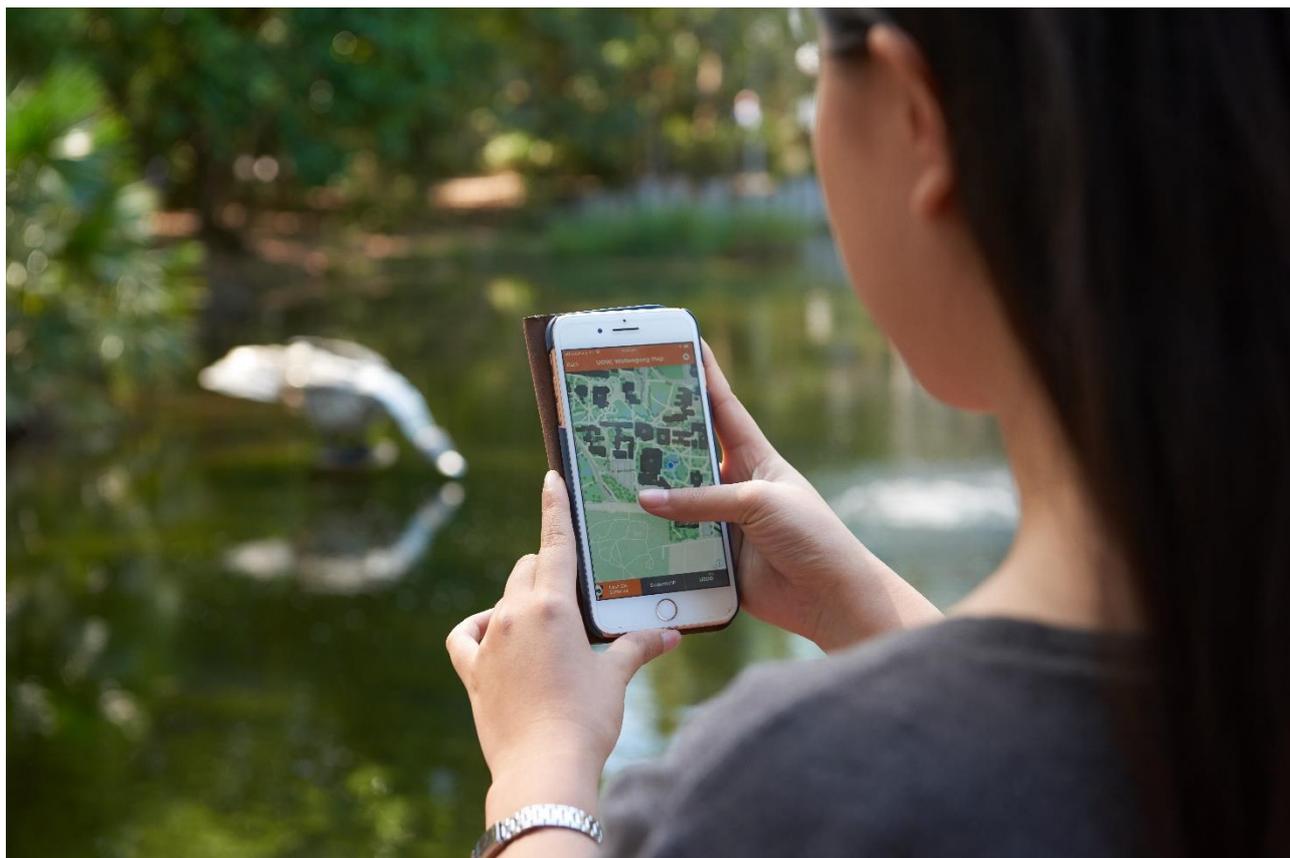

MYUOW UNIVERSITY APP

The MyUOW mobile app is a way for University students, staff and guests to stay connected to what's happening at the University. MyUOW is free to download from the app store and is available on both [Apple iOS](#) and [Android](#) devices.

PARTICIPATION IN THE UNIVERSITY'S GOVERNANCE

Opportunities exist for staff, students and members of the community to participate in all facets of the governance of the University through its Council, committees, advisory groups and forums.

The University values the participation of both staff and students in its decision making. Each year, the University hosts elections for a number of staff and student positions on governance bodies to ensure that all perspectives are considered.

The University Council consists of 17 members in the following categories:



- 3 Ex-Officio Positions: Chancellor; Vice-Chancellor; Chair of Academic Senate
- 2 members appointed by the NSW Minister for Education
- 7 members appointed by the Council
- 2 members elected by and from the Academic Senate of the University
- 1 member appointed by the Council from the graduates of the University
- 2 members elected by and from the Students of the University: 1 undergraduate student elected by and from the undergraduate students of the University; and 1 postgraduate student elected by and from the postgraduate students of the University.

Council meetings are open to members of the University on request. Members of the University who wish to attend a Council meeting should contact the Governance Unit at governance@uow.edu.au at least 2 weeks prior to the meeting. The Vice-Chancellor arranges for decisions of Council to be reported publicly whenever this is appropriate.

[Advisory groups to the Vice-Chancellor](#) have been established to share important information across a range of matters that refine and focus on the University's strategic direction and provide a forum for open discussion. These groups include the University Leadership Group, the Performance and Expenditure Group and the Rankings & Strategy Advisory Group.

Students have a range of opportunities to actively engage with the University as a student representative. For example, the [Student Advisory Council](#) ("SAC") was formed in 2018 to provide the University greater ability to hear and respond to the wider student voice. SAC provides a forum where student representatives are able to proactively engage with one another to formulate common and group-specific student issues for presentation to the University. SAC is actively involved in University matters affecting the academic and social wellbeing of students including its policies, procedures, student service delivery and expenditure of student service and amenities funds by the University. All feedback and complaints received by the University are treated in a confidential manner and any personal information is managed in accordance with the University's obligations under the *Privacy and Personal Information Protection Act 1998* (NSW) and the *Health Records and Information Privacy Act 2002* (NSW). How to access information held by the University

The University is bound by the *State Records Act 1998* (NSW) in the creation, management and protection of its records. Records exist in relation to the University's business activities and include information as outlined in this Guide and on its website.

Under the GIPA Act, there are four avenues which the public may access information held by the University unless there is an overriding public interest against disclosure. These include via:

- Open access information
- Proactive release of information
- Informal access request
- Formal access application

OPEN ACCESS INFORMATION

Information classified as open access information is the type of information that the University is required to make available to the public, free of charge unless it is not in the public interest to do so. This includes:

- this Agency Information Guide;
- policy documents, available in the University's [Policy Directory](#);
- documents about the University tabled in the NSW Parliament (such as the University's Annual Report)
- disclosure log of access applications that the University considers to be in the broader public interest;
- a [register of contracts](#) entered into by the University in which the University spends, or is likely to spend, over \$150,000.

PROACTIVE RELEASE OF INFORMATION

The University is required to have a program for the proactive release of information it holds. The University reviews its proactive release program at intervals of not more than 12 months as required under the GIPA Act, this is reviewed annually.

The University's current program for the proactive release of information involves:



- reviewing the types of information requested by the public, both informally and formally, to assess whether it may be of interest to the public generally;
- regularly promoting and actioning feedback from staff, students and members of the public via its surveys, helpdesks and various social media channels;
- promoting release of University information across its business units.

The University routinely publishes a range of information that may be of interest to the public, free of charge on its website, unless there is an overriding public interest against disclosure.

- The [UOW Archives](#) site holds a large range of records documenting the University's corporate, academic and social history.
- The UOW [research online](#) site is an open-access, institutional repository promoting the scholarly output of the University of Wollongong. Research Online holds a mixture of open-access full-text objects and metadata-only records.

If the information sought is not already available on the University's website, members of the public are encouraged to contact a [Right to Information Officer](#) to discuss the proactive release of the information that may be of interest to the public.

INFORMAL ACCESS

Members of the public can request access to information that is not available on the University's website. Where the University deems the requested information to be in the public interest to disclose, the University may treat this as an informal access application and release the information free of charge. The University may attach conditions to the release of information. There is no right of review of informal access applications.



Treating requests as an informal access application is at the discretion of the University. The University may require that you lodge a formal access application and pay the relevant fee (see below section relating to Formal Access applications).

If you would like to make an informal request for information, please contact the University's [Right to Information Officer](#).

FORMAL ACCESS APPLICATION

Information that is not readily available and cannot be accessed through an informal request for information will require a formal access application to be lodged with the University.

Formal access applications will be subject to an application fee of \$30. An additional processing fee of \$30 per hour may also be payable. If you are requesting access to your own personal information, the first 20 hours of processing will not be charged. Some applicants may be entitled to a 50% reduction in the processing charge, where either financial hardship or a special benefit to the public exists.

When lodging a formal access application, the application must:

- be in writing and addressed to the University of Wollongong;
- be lodged with the University via email or post;
- clearly indicate that it is a formal access application;
- include the payment of the \$30 application fee;
- provide the name of the applicant and either an email or postal address for correspondence in connection with the application; and
- include such information as is reasonably necessary to enable the information applied for to be identified by the University.

Individuals have the right to request a review of certain decisions made by the University in response to a formal access application. A review may be conducted internally, or externally by the Office of the Information and Privacy Commissioner ("IPC") or the NSW Civil and Administrative Tribunal. A fee of \$40 applies for an internal review application. Further information regarding review rights is available on the [IPC](#) website.

EXCLUDED INFORMATION



The GIPA Act prescribes that some information held by Universities, specifically *“functions relating to dealing with information with respect to the ranking or assessment of students who have completed the Higher School Certificate for entrance into tertiary institutions”*, is excluded information.

This means that there is a conclusive presumption against the release of this information unless the University consents to its disclosure. In accordance with the GIPA Act, an application cannot be made to the University for access to excluded information. Consequently, the application will be deemed to be an invalid application.

ACCESS TO PERSONAL INFORMATION

In addition to the informal and formal access pathways under the GIPA Act (discussed above), individuals may also exercise their right to access their personal information under NSW privacy laws.

Personal information and health information is managed by the University in accordance with the *Privacy and Personal Information Protection Act 1998* (NSW) and the *Health Records and Information Privacy Act 2002* (NSW). Members of staff who wish to obtain access to their personal staff records should contact the University’s People and Culture Division via the HR Helpdesk.

Students who wish to obtain access to their personal student records should contact Student Central on 1300 275 869 or email askuow@uow.edu.au. Requests for formal academic records i.e. academic transcript, testamur and AHEGS will incur a fee. Fee information can be found on the [Official Documentation and Transcripts page](#).

Other members of the University community who wish to obtain access to their personal or health information should contact the University’s [Right to Information Officer](#).

The University does not provide third party access to an individual’s personal information without the knowledge or permission of the individual concerned unless there is a legal requirement or legal authority to do so.

RIGHT TO INFORMATION OFFICERS

Right to Information Officers are staff members who have been given authority and responsibility by the Vice Chancellor and President to meet the University’s obligations under the GIPA Act.

The Vice-Chancellor has provided authority for officers located in the Office of General Counsel to manage requests for Records under the GIPA Act. Any enquiries or requests for access to information can be made to:

THE OFFICE OF THE INFORMATION AND PRIVACY COMMISSIONER (IPC)

The NSW Information and Privacy Commission (IPC) is a separate agency that administers NSW legislation dealing with privacy and access to government information.

The Information Commissioner is responsible for promoting public awareness and understanding of the GIPA Act, and providing information, support, advice, assistance and training to agencies and the general public.
