Koalas at the Cross-Roads at Wollongong Botanic Garden: Why did the Koala cross the Road? To get to the habitat on the other side. It is estimated that millions of Koalas were in Australia when the first Europeans arrived, but numbers today are as low as 80,000 or less. Some of us only see them as road-kill. Busy roads and Koalas don't mix. But Climate change is an even bigger threat to Koala survival, with increased occurrence of bushfires and loss of habitat this national treasure is even more vulnerable than ever.



To help people appreciate the plight of Koalas in a changing climate Wollongong Botanic Garden has created a self-guided walk for Global Climate Change week, focusing on trees used for food and shelter. Koalas really do cross the road to get to their ever-shrinking habitat on the other side, so why not join them across Northfields Avenue at the Wollongong Botanic Garden side and learn what you can do to help Save this vulnerable native species.
