The Project Air Strategy for Personality Disorders, Illawarra Health and Medical Research Institute, Wollongong University Professional and Clinical Psychology programs and NSW Ministry of Health invite you to the 12th International Conference on the Treatment of Personality Disorders. The theme "New ways of working with antisocial personalities and early intervention" provides a unique opportunity to be updated with the latest research in Australia and internationally. Experts in the field will present a variety of papers and posters covering topics including the consumer and carers perspective, research, and innovative service developments.

The FRIDAY CONFERENCE will feature a number of national and international presentations on developments in the field of personality disorders treatment. Keynote speaker, **Professor Anthony Bateman** (UK), will present on "**Working with antisocial personality disorder: what research and clinical experience teaches us**".

Professor Bateman discusses "*People with antisocial personality disorder (ASPD) find it hard to change and clinicians find it equally hard to help them change. A brief summary will be given of some of the evidence base for treatment of ASPD. Research so far has not led to clear recommendations for treatment. So the disorder remains a significant problem for the individuals themselves and for society. Our current research using Mentalisation Based Treatment (MBT), delivered to people with ASPD at the interface between health and the criminal justice system, has exposed a range of challenges for clinicians – how to a) decide on the structure of treatment, for example individual or group treatment; b) develop an alliance infused with optimism and trust; c) increase motivation to change without being coercive; d) manage comorbidity such as drug abuse and alcohol misuse; e) work with risk within a multi-agency system. More significantly the clinician has to maintain focus and agree boundaries and manage his or her own counter-relational feelings that interfere with treatment. All these issues will be discussed.*"

Another Keynote speaker, **Dr Steve Gillard** (UK) will present on "**Peer work – roles, research and methodology**".

There will be a number of other speakers throughout the conference talking about research, service developments and innovative approaches to treatment and early intervention.

The **SATURDAY WORKSHOP** is presented by **Professor Anthony Bateman** (UK) for clinicians and health professionals and is an opportunity to learn from a distinguished researcher and clinical psychologist in a workshop titled: ***Mentalisation Based Therapy for antisocial personality disorder: clinical dilemmas and recommendations.***

Invitation to present at the conference:

Due date: 1 August 2018. We invite brief presentations and posters to update on research, new innovations and treatment extensions within personality disorder services (e.g. model, structure, implementation, and evaluation), or presentations on another issue relevant to personality disorders. Presentations are informal and will be time limited to approximately 15-30 minutes depending on the schedule. You will be informed prior to the conference about your presentation and the duration. Depending on time constraints, not all applications to present may be allocated in the program, and some may be requested to prepare posters. Poster size should be approximately 80 cm across x 100cm high.

Professor Anthony Bateman MA, FRCPsych is Consultant to the Anna Freud Centre, London; Visiting Professor University College, London; Honorary Professor in Psychotherapy University of Copenhagen.

Professor Bateman developed mentalisation based treatment for borderline personality disorder with Professor Peter Fonagy and studied its effectiveness in research trials. Adapted versions are now being used in multi-centre trials for antisocial personality disorder, eating disorders, and drug addiction. He was an expert member of National Institute for Clinical Excellence (NICE) development group for treatment guidelines for Borderline Personality Disorder in UK and was Chair of the National Guideline Development Group for Eating Disorders. His NHS clinical services are recognised by the Department of

Health as a national demonstration site for the treatment of personality disorder. He was President of the European Society for the Study of Personality Disorders (ESSPD) from 2012-2015.

He received a senior scientist award from British and Irish group for the Study of Personality Disorder in 2012 and in 2015 the annual award for "Achievement in the Field of Severe Personality Disorders" from the BPDR in the USA.

He has authored 14 books including Psychotherapy for Borderline Personality Disorder: mentalization based treatment and Mentalization Based Treatment for Personality Disorder: a practical guide (2016) (with Peter Fonagy), numerous book chapters, and over 150 peer reviewed research articles on personality disorder and the use of psychotherapy in psychiatric practice.

Dr Steve Gillard is Reader in Social and Community Mental Health in the Population Health Research Institute at St George's, University of London. His current research focuses on the increasing role played by people with lived experience of mental health problems in producing the support that they make use of - the development of more distributed forms of mental health care - including the introduction of new Peer Worker roles into mental health services.

His research is underpinned by standpoint epistemology and co-production approaches to research; working alongside researchers with lived experience to critique and strengthen, methodologically, the way in which we produce knowledge about mental health.

Professor Anthony Bateman: Saturday one-day workshop

Overview:

The diagnostic descriptors of antisocial personality disorder (ASPD) include failing to conform to social norms with respect to lawful behaviours, deceitfulness, impulsivity or failure to plan ahead, irritability and aggressiveness, reckless disregard for safety of self or other, consistent irresponsibility, and lack of remorse. We reconceptualised these symptoms as arising from a failure in balanced mentalising, in which some aspects of mentalising are over used whilst others are under-used, with the aim of developing more effective treatment (Bateman & Fonagy, 2011; Bateman, Fonagy, & Bolton, 2013); no treatment has yet been shown to be effective in these individuals.

Mentalising is the process by which we implicitly and explicitly interpret the actions of ourselves and others as meaningful on the basis of intentional mental states. We mentalise interactively and emotionally when with others. Mentalising processes facilitate effective social and interpersonal understanding and interaction and lead to self-awareness and other awareness (Fonagy, Luyten, & Bateman, 2015), all of which are compromised in people with ASPD (Bateman & Fonagy, 2008).

MBT interventions, originally organised as for BPD (Bateman & Fonagy, 2016) and for young people who self-harm (Rossouw & Fonagy, 2012), have now been adapted for the treatment of people with ASPD and conduct disorder (Bateman, O'Connell, Lorenzini, Gardner, & Fonagy, 2016) in accordance with this reconceptualisation. The aim of treatment is to address the specific mentalising difficulties of people with ASPD. In this workshop the mentalising framework for understanding ASPD will be described and the treatment intervention will be outlined using illustrative clinical examples and video.

Mentalisation based treatment for ASPD integrates cognitive and relational components of therapy and has a theoretical basis in attachment theory.

Key interventions for clinicians to address these problems of ASPD will be discussed.

By the end of this workshop the participants will be able to:

1. Understand the mental processes leading to violence and other behaviours
2. Demonstrate an understanding of the mentalising problems relevant to treatment
3. Recognise mentalizing and non-mentalizing interventions
4. Use some basic mentalising techniques in everyday clinical work

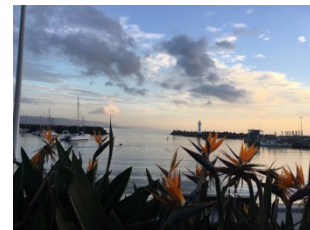
